Nicholas J. Healy taught at New York University as an adjunct professor of law for almost 40 years, from 1947 to 1986, and has been described as "the finest admiralty lawyer in the United States and probably the world." (Journal of Maritime Law and Commerce 1991, vol. 22, no. 3, 345)

In 1992, his partners, friends, and admirers established a lectureship in his honor at NYU School of Law to continue the tradition of scholarly consideration of maritime law topics. Beginning with the first lecture held on November 5, 1992, presented by the Honorable John R. Brown, lecturers and their topics have been of the utmost interest to all concerned with the understanding and development of maritime law in the United States.
